CLUB

Membership

When you join our club you are entitled to train at any GSDCV branch. Just produce your current membership card and as a courtesy, always ask if there are any local branch rules to be aware of eg. dogs always on leash during training time etc.

Branch Training

Weekly training is the cornerstone of our club and we encourage all members to come along, if for nothing more than the benefits of the social interaction it offers for both members and also their dogs. Not to be underestimated!

Fundays

Each year, the GSDCV runs a 'Fun Day' where members from each branch throughout Victoria come together at a central venue and 'compete' in basic obedience and showing, whilst representing their branch. This day is all about participation and enjoyment, and allows those wanting some extra experience to challenge themselves to 'bring home a ribbon'. There are games and lots of fun for you and your dog.

Social Events

Dog Obedience – 'Training for Life'

Most members come along to GSDCV branches in order to achieve a basic level of training for their dogs, so that they can be well behaved canine citizens, who are a pleasure to live with and to take out and about. A well trained GSD is a joy to own. Sometimes extra work is required with dogs that may be difficult or not well adjusted to the activities of life

But there is so much more that you can be involved with and that you and your dog can enjoy. Once your dog has achieved a standard of obedience and behaviour, you might consider getting involved in other activities. As a GSDCV member, you can get involved in a range of things with your dog, from competitions to community activities and promotions. Alternatively, if your dog is not quite ready, you can still be involved yourself. Read on......

PUBLICITY & PROMOTIONS

Pet Expos & Public Demonstrations

The GSDCV regularly attends local council Pet Expos, Shows and Pet Days. This is always a great opportunity to showcase the German Shepherd breed, and provide info about our dogs and our club. Often, a team of club members and their dogs will put on a display of basic obedience and tricks. Demos such as this are always well received. The public also like the opportunity to get up close and personal with a German Shepherd, and there is nothing better to sell our breed than a hug and pat with a well socialised GSD.

TRIALLING

As our breed is a working breed, where better than the trial area to see the ability and extended level of obedience these dogs and handlers can aspire to and achieve!

Trials include - Obedience, Rally-O, Tracking, Endurance and Herding

Obedience

Obedience trials are a test of the dog and handler working as a team to complete various exercises. These exercises must be done in a prescribed manner, and the level of difficulty increases over the various levels. In the lower trial classes (CCD & Novice), the basics are Heeling, Stand for Examination, Recall and Sit and Down Stays. In Novice there's also a change of position or a retrieve of the dumbbell. At the higher levels, all work is done offlead and also jumping and scent discrimination are required. All a big challenge for you and your dog! Rally - O

Rally-Obedience is a new form of obedience trialling. The obedience exercises are in a course situation with signs for activities. Unlike in traditional obedience trials, handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs during the course, so you may use verbal praise and petting. The course is laid out using numbered signs which instruct the team to go fast or slow, to halt (dog sit at heel), to make turns and circles, to reverse direction, to do a sit-stayrecall, to go over a jump, and to follow other basic obedience exercises.

Tracking

The idea of Tracking Trials is to encourage dogs to make use of their strongest faculty by copying as closely as possible, the seeking and finding of a missing person. In Tracking trials we ask the dog to track to a pattern that we set out in the bush or a paddock, following it intensely, taking the corners and finally finding the tracklayer at the end of the track.

There are 8 tests from 400m-1200m long and to pass each Test the Tracklayer must be found at the end of each Track to obtain a Pass. Track and Search trials in urban streets are the next level.

Many branches have active members and instructors who are involved in tracking and could assist you.

Endurance

The ET is a 20km run for the dog and the handler can run or ride a bike. Its completed at 10km/hr in 3 stages: 8km, 6km and 6km with 15min and 20min breaks. There is a short obedience test for the dogs prior to and at the end of the 20km – they must 'want' to work doing a basic obedience test. There is a vet check before, at each break and at the end of the 20km. Vets check heart rate, temperature and condition of the dogs foot pads.

The ET is a challenge of both you and your dogs fitness.

When all is done, you have your ET!

The ET is held in June each year and your dog must be between 2 and 8 years old to compete.

GSD's were bred for herding. There are currently 3 herding courses for competition. The dog works with (mainly) sheep and must herd them through obstacles and along a known route. The dog requires herding instinct, training and obedience - and respect for the sheep! Herding is a small sport, but there are local trials that you can compete in.

Agility

Most branches have various types of agility equipment that they make available to members. Agility requires a basic level of obedience and control. The GSDCV does not run competition agility trials, but these are available through Dogs Victoria Clubs.

Trials and Titles

When you achieve a title through trialling, the letters of that title can be placed at the end of your dog's name and becomes part of the registered name. What an achievement!

SHOWING

A dog Show is the 'window to the breed' and dogs are judged on their conformation (structure) and how they perform in comparison to the other dogs in the ring on the day. There are both specialist GSD shows and All breed shows to compete in. The show ring can be a lot of fun for you and your dog.

Long Coated GSD's can now also be shown if registered as a 'long stock coat GSD'. In order to show your dog, generally they must not have been spayed or neutered. However there are special neuter classes.

Many GSDCV Branches run Show classes, or the alternative is to attend the Specialist Show Branch at KCC Park Skye for help

How can my breeder help?

Ask your breeder for guidance with your dog, its suitability for showing and any questions on its conformation. They may also be able to assist with ring training, teaching you to 'stack' your dog in a show stance and attending the show. They are your best source of assistance if you're interested in showing, as most breeders are involved themselves.

What Might You Need to Do?

In order to participate or compete in some of the previous activities, in addition to being a GSDCV member. you may have to complete and check some further important aspects.

Joining Dogs Victoria

In order to compete in any trial or show you must first become a member of Dogs Victoria (DV). You must also register (if not already done so) your dog(s) that you wish to compete with. Application forms from the Dogs Vic website: www.dogsvictoria.org.au You will then receive a monthly Dogs Vic Gazette. The Gazette contains schedules for future trials and shows which detail the host club, time & date, judges, details of entry, payment and the entry closing date.

Does my dog have the right papers???

Pedigree registrations are issued by the VCA (Victorian Canine Association) after application by the Breeder (who must be registered with the VCA). Main Register pedigrees are blue, whilst Limited Register pedigrees are orange in colour. Dogs registered on the Limited Register may not be exhibited in conformation shows, nor can they be bred with, but can still be entered in Obedience Trials. **Dogs registered on the Main Register are eligible** to participate in all of the above areas.

GSD's without pedigrees can be registered as 'associates'. There are many Open obedience, Rally-O, tracking, endurance and herding trials you are eligible to enter with vour doa.
